Conduct, with the involvement of parents, an evaluation of the content and effectiveness of the family engagement plan in improving the academic quality of the Title I, Part A schools, including identifying barriers to greater participation by parents in Title I, part A activities, and use the findings of such evaluations to design strategies for more effective parent involvement.
 6. Involve parents in the activities of Title I, part A schools.

- 7. Monitor your child's progress and contact teachers, the counselor, or the principal as needed
- 8. Call the office to schedule appointments
- 9. Review your child's records when needed
- 10. Volunteer at school
- 11. Participate in parent organizations ranging from booster clubs to committees that assist the administration and Board of Trustees in formulating educational goals and objectives
- 12. Familiarize yourself with federally funded programs such as Title I that provide important educational support services
